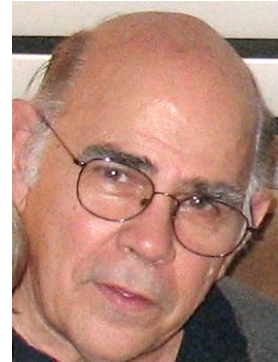

Replacing Microsoft Word, Excel and PowerPoint....for free!

If you recently obtained a new Windows computer you may find out that you can't open or create Word files, Excel files or Powerpoint files without paying homage (\$\$\$) to Microsoft. That version of Word or Excel that you had on your old computer cannot be transferred to the new computer without the original CD's. If Word or Excel came as part of the old computer, chances are that you don't have those CDs. What to do?



Well, you could pay the \$100.00 that Microsoft is requesting or you could find an alternative program which is compatible with the MS Office Suite.

Two "Open Source" products are available to solve this problem. The oldest product of this type is called Open Office while the latest offering (which is a bit more modern and comprehensive) is called Libre Office. We have Open Office installed at the Computer Center. Click on the links provided for a free download.

If you haven't heard the term "Open Source" before, let me tell you about it. If a program is open-source, its source code is freely available to its users. Its users – and anyone else – have the ability to take this source code, modify it, and distribute their own versions of the program. The users also have the ability to distribute as many copies of the original program as they want. Anyone can use the program for any purpose; there are no licensing fees or other restrictions on the software.

Give it a try.

All About Email

As of January 1st, many Rossmoor residents will be getting Comcast internet for the first time. As with other ISPs (Internet Service Providers), Comcast will provide you with an email address, in the format of [yourname@comcast.net](#).

Even though Comcast is your ISP, you are of course free to use other email services. Many technology companies provide free email addresses. Here are a few of the more popular ones:

- Google: Gmail.com
 - With over 1 BILLION users worldwide, this is probably the most widely used email address among those offered by non-ISPs
- Microsoft :
 - Over the years, they have offered free Hotmail.com and MSN.com email accounts. More recently, Microsoft has added a new email domain of Outlook.com.
- Yahoo: Yahoo.com
- AOL: Aol.com
 - Yes, this long-time email provider is still around, though not anywhere near as popular as they were 20 years ago

Some people use more than one email address and/or email provider as a way to segregate their mail. For example: you could use [yourname@Comcast.net](#) for communicating with friends and family, and also use [yourname@gmail.com](#) for your online purchases. That way, any resulting shipping notices and junk mail won't clog up your "friends and family" inbox. Personally, I have 4 email accounts: One for friends/family, another for those aforementioned internet purchases, and one for staying in contact with former work colleagues. And then there's my newest email account, the one that has the most activity: it's the email address I set up for handling my personal Computer Club correspondence!

A Special Note about AT&T email

Many Rossmoor residents have used AT&T's DSL service, which delivers an internet connection via an AT&T's phone line (Comcast differs in that it delivers internet via a cable connection). In conjunction with having the DSL account, users were provided with an email domain of att.net or SBCGlobal.net.

Now that Comcast will be the ISP for all Rossmoor households, those AT&T DSL users will undoubtedly cancel their service. So the question has come up: "If I'm no longer using AT&T's DSL service, will they allow me to keep using my att.net or SBCGlobal.net email address?" After all, if all your contacts have your AT&T email address, you probably won't be looking forward to letting everyone know your email address will be changing!

We have checked with AT&T regarding this question and are happy to report that AT&T will allow people to retain their att.net (or SBCglobal.net) email address even after the DSL service is cancelled. Of course, as we all know, companies sometimes provide inaccurate information, so we can't guarantee you won't lose your AT&T address after discontinuing DSL service. However, we are 98% confident you will be ok.

By the way, a unique characteristic of ATT's email is that they contract with Yahoo to provide the interface for accessing your mail. That's why when you go to the internet to get your ATT mail (att.yahoo.com) you see both the AT&T and Yahoo logos.

Did You Know?

When typing an email address, it's unnecessary to distinguish between uppercase and lowercase letters. It's true: email addresses are never case-sensitive. Whether you type MarySmith@comcast.net or marysmith@Comcast.netor any other variation, Mary Smith will get your email.
